Readings from: John 13:1-17, Luke 22:15-29, John 13:33-35,

John 14:23-31, 1 Corinthians 11:23-25

Part 1:

Leader: The chief priests and the elders of the people assembled in the

palace of the high priest, whose name was Caiaphas, and they schemed to arrest Jesus secretly and kill him. "But not during the festival," they said, "or there may be a riot among the people."

Then one of the Twelve—the one called Judas Iscariot—went to the chief priests and asked, "What are you willing to give me if I deliver him over to you?" So they counted out for him thirty pieces of silver. From then on Judas watched for an opportunity to hand him over.

It was just before the Passover Festival. Jesus knew that the hour had come for him to leave this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end.

The evening meal was in progress, and the devil had already prompted Judas, the son of Simon Iscariot, to betray Jesus. Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God; so he got up from the meal, took off his outer clothing, and wrapped a towel around his waist. After that, he poured water into a basin and began to wash his disciples' feet, drying them with the towel that was wrapped around him.

People: He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to

wash my feet?"

Leader: Jesus replied, "You do not realize now what I am doing, but later

you will understand."

People: "No," said Peter, "you shall never wash my feet."

Leader: Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no part with me."

People: "Then, Lord," Simon Peter replied, "not just my feet but my hands

and my head as well!"

Leader:

Jesus answered, "Those who have had a bath need only to wash their feet; their whole body is clean. And you are clean, though not every one of you." For he knew who was going to betray him, and that was why he said not every one was clean.

When he had finished washing their feet, he put on his clothes and returned to his place. "Do you understand what I have done for you?" he asked them. "You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and rightly so, for that is what I am. Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you. Very truly I tell you, no servant is greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him. Now that you know these things, you will be blessed if you do them.

Part 2:

Leader:

When the hour came, Jesus and his apostles reclined at the table. And he said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. For I tell you, I will not eat it again until it finds fulfillment in the kingdom of God."

Then Jesus took a cup of wine, and when he had given thanks for it, he said, "Take this and share it among yourselves. For I will not drink wine again until the Kingdom of God has come."

Then he took a loaf of bread; and when he had thanked God for it, he broke it in pieces and gave it to the disciples, saying, "This is my body, given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." After supper he took another cup of wine and said, "This cup is God's new covenant to save you—an agreement sealed with the blood I will pour out for you."

"I am not referring to all of you; I know those I have chosen. But this is to fulfill this passage of Scripture: 'He who shared my bread has turned against me.'

"I am telling you now before it happens, so that when it does happen you will believe that I am who I am. Very truly I tell you, whoever accepts anyone I send accepts me; and whoever accepts me accepts the one who sent me." After he had said this, Jesus was troubled in spirit and testified, "Very truly I tell you, one of you is going to betray me."

His disciples stared at one another, at a loss to know which of them he meant.

"But here at this table, sitting among us as a friend, is the man who will betray me. For I, the Son of Man, must die since it is part of God's plan. But how terrible it will be for my betrayer!"

People: They were very sad and began to say to him one after the other,

"Surely you don't mean me, Lord?"

Leader: Then the disciples began to question among themselves which of

them it might be who would do this.

People: A dispute also arose among them as to which of them was

considered to be greatest.

Leader: Jesus told them, "In this world the kings and great men order their people around, and yet they are called `friends of the people.'

But among you, those who are the greatest should take the

lowest rank, and the leader should be like a servant.

Normally the master sits at the table and is served by his servants. But not here! For I am your servant. You have remained true to me in my time of trial. And just as my Father has granted me a Kingdom, I now grant you the right to eat and drink at my

table in that Kingdom."

"Dear children, how brief are these moments before I must go away and leave you! Then, though you search for me, you cannot come to me—just as I told the Jewish leaders. So now I am giving you a new commandment: Love each other. Just as I have loved you, you should love each other. Your love for one another will prove to the world that you are my disciples.

People: Simon Peter asked him, "Lord, where are you going?"

Leader: Jesus replied, "Where I am going, you cannot follow now, but you

will follow later."

People: Peter asked, "Lord, why can't I follow you now? I will lay down my

life for you."

Leader:

Then Jesus answered, "Will you really lay down your life for me? Very truly I tell you, before the rooster crows, you will disown me three times!

All those who love me will do what I say. My Father will love them, and we will come to them and live with them. Anyone who doesn't love me will not do what I say. And remember, my words are not my own. This message is from the Father who sent me. I am telling you these things now while I am still with you.

But when the Father sends the Counsellor as my representative-and by the Counsellor I mean the Holy Spirit--he will teach you everything and will remind you of everything I myself have told you."

"I am leaving you with a gift—peace of mind and heart. And the peace I give isn't like the peace the world gives. So don't be troubled or afraid. Remember what I told you: I am going away, but I will come back to you again.

If you really love me, you will be very happy for me, because now I can go to the Father, who is greater than I am. I have told you these things before they happen so that you will believe when they do happen."

"I don't have much more time to talk to you, because the prince of this world approaches. He has no power over me, but I will do what the Father requires of me, so that the world will know that I love the Father."

Enacting the Lord's Supper ...

Part 3:

Leader:

For I pass on to you what I received from the Lord himself. On the night when he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread and gave thanks to God for it. Then he broke it in pieces and said, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this to remember me." In the same way, he took the cup of wine after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant between God and his people—an agreement confirmed with my blood. Do this to remember me as often as you drink it."

Read together:

So now we have been given a new commandment: Love one other. Just as Christ has loved us, so we should love each other. Our love for one another should prove to the world that we are Christ's disciples.

Closing prayer:

You call us to follow where you have walked:
to show compassion to the poor,
to support the weak,
to embrace the outcast,
to bring lives into your kingdom.

Yet our hearts are troubled--we are fearful of the task,
deafened to your promise to be with us.

Grant us peace for this journey
and strength for the day
May we demonstrate your love
in the life we live and the life we share.
